Subject: URGENT - Proposed closure of the Horsham Drill Hall - HDC vote 23rd January

Dear supporter

The government has recognised the contribution made by village halls to the local community i.e in combatting loneliness. See today's [Daily Telegraph article](#) The article 'Brightening up village halls helps to tackle loneliness' starts with:

'The Government is redecorating crumbling village halls across the country alongside a scheme aimed at tackling loneliness. Halls in need of repair have already been granted £1.2 million of funding in order to turn them into centres of the community.

Grants of up to £75,000 to make improvements to halls are still available.'

The following information is circulated at the request of Horsham Blueprint and Horsham Denne Neighbourhood Council

'Horsham District Council (HDC) proposes to decommission the Horsham Drill Hall as they consider it not fit for purpose. HDC believes it can provide alternative community facilities on the Highwood Development to the South West of town – a facility it is already committed to provide under the Land West of Horsham 2008 Master Plan.

When the old Horsham Town Hall was closed, residents were promised that the Drill Hall would remain as the community hall for the Town. It hosts concerts, beer festivals, job fairs, dances, adult education, the list goes on. It remains the only venue in Horsham able to host many of these functions, which the report supporting the proposal admits could not be accommodated at the proposed Highwood Community Centre, stating that 'further consultation is required.'

The Highwood site is 3 miles from town by road, only be accessible from the A24. The development has no public transport and is 2 miles from Horsham Railway Station away on foot. Parking provision at Highwood remains an unanswered question.

Local councillors were only told of these proposals 7 days before a decision is to be made, and many stakeholders are only to be fully briefed 72 hours before the Cabinet meeting. The decision will be taken by 7 Councillors, only one of whom actually represents a Horsham Town Ward. This does not meet any reasonable standard of either community consultation or democratic accountability.

We respectfully request:

- That Cabinet defer making a decision on the future of the Drill Hall until a proper plan can be formulated to either upgrade the Drill Hall or provide the Town with a community hall at

its heart that is fit to meet the needs of its residents.

- That the Drill Hall continues to be available to the community until it is either renovated, rebuilt or replaced in the centre of Town.
- That a meaningful consultation with the community and its representatives on any proposals is undertaken and the final decision is taken by Full Council, not Cabinet.


Horsham District Older Peoples Forum

Budget Update



Key dates for our budget setting

Plans to cover the costs of a growing demand for services will be reviewed by West Sussex County Council Cabinet Members at a meeting next week (Tuesday 28 January 2020).

The draft budget includes details of investment in areas which need improvement, with £12m identified for improvements in Children's Services and £2.6m for improvements in the Fire and Rescue Service.

The Cabinet will go through the proposed budget for 2020/21 before it goes before a meeting of the full council in February for final approval.

The Cabinet will also consider comments from the Performance and Finance Scrutiny Committee, which met earlier this week.

Comment from the Cabinet Member for Finance

Jeremy Hunt, West Sussex County Council Cabinet Member for Finance, said:
"Like many other local authorities across the country we are facing a huge demand for our services, against a backdrop of a significant reduction in government funding since 2010/11.

"In West Sussex we have been clear that we have some real challenges in service delivery that we need to address and future investment is a big part of that.

"The draft budget papers present a balanced position for the coming year, but also highlight a substantial budget gap of £45m over the following three years.

"To help alleviate pressures on our revenue budget, our £712m five-year capital programme includes more 'invest to save' schemes and further plans to invest in our successful income generating initiatives such as energy solar farms and battery storage projects."

Chief Executives Weekly Bulletin

New Code of Audit Practice

I was pleased this week to be briefed by the National Audit Office (NAO) on the [new Code of Audit Practice](#), which has been laid in Parliament. We are hopeful that the revised Code's emphasis on proportionality and the expectation of better communication around objection work might help address some of the concerns that smaller councils, in particular, have raised with us, and which we have raised with the NAO and through the Redmond Review. The new Code comes into force on 1 April 2020 and will apply from audits of local bodies' 2020/21 financial statements onwards.

Rural Coalition

The Rural Coalition – which brings together key national organisations including NALC, Action with Communities in Rural England, National Farmers Union and CPRE (The Countryside Charity) to ensure rural areas are not overlooked by the government – met on 22 January and was attended by myself and our chairman, Cllr Sue Baxter. The meeting received an update from a deputy director from the Department for Environment, Food and Rural affairs on emerging themes in the new government including progress on extending rural proofing, which the coalition has consistently called for. We pressed the importance of the forthcoming devolution white paper to include action on rural areas and support vital local community infrastructure. The emerging theme that emerged from discussions was the importance of engaging with new rural MPs! So I would urge you to make contact with your MP as part of Lobby Day preparations by writing to congratulate them, flagging up local issues, invite them to events, meetings and any openings, and crucially tell them the brilliant things you are doing to make your communities stronger.

NALC Larger Councils Committee

The Larger Councils Committee held its first meeting of 2020 at CCLA's London offices on 21 January. Cllr Paul Harvey (West Bletchley Council) was re-elected as committee chairman for 2020, and Cllr Peter Astell (Beverley Town Council) vice-chairman for 2020 – well done both! The committee received a presentation on the [NALC strategic plan 2019-22](#) (login required) and engagement with the new government and discussed some ways it could support these through its work programme such as sharing good practice and events, engagement with MPs, and our campaigns on council tax referendums and the toilet tax.

Great British Spring Clean 2020

This week our policy adviser, Andrew Tubb, was in Parliament for the launch of the Keep Britain Tidy (KBT) Great British Spring Clean 2020. This year's event will take place from 20 March to 13 April and aims to build on last year's success of over 560,000 #LitterHeroes joining forces to collect litter. I think this campaign provides a significant opportunity for local councils to bring the community together, help health

and social wellbeing, and improve the environment – you can find out more [here](#), and please do get involved!

Code of conduct workshops

Over the last couple of weeks, colleagues from NALC and county associations have attended workshops convened by the Local Government Association (LGA) on developing a new model code of conduct. The sessions were attended by representatives from bodies across local government including monitoring officers, and considered types of codes and what the content of the recommended new code should be, by way of case studies, plus consideration of the role of social media. Issues raised by our colleagues included sanctions, training and interests. In terms of next steps, we expect draft model code to be consulted upon in coming months as the LGA is aiming to publish the new code at its conference in July.

NALC phone system upgrade

We will be upgrading our phone system on 27 January, and while there is expected to be very little disruption, lines may be unavailable for a short period during the changeover. The future of Scouting in Horsham's new developments

Last year the Government announced that there are to be thousands of new homes built in and around Horsham over the next two decades. Many of these are to be on new estates or large extensions to existing settlements.

We know, from the continued success of Scouting in Horsham that there will be a demand from young people for Scout activities. Nearly all our Scout Groups have waiting lists and we have major challenges in meeting demand. We have analysed what is needed and have just produced

the attached briefing paper setting out what we see as our needs and aspirations for the future. As the briefing paper explains, there are certain minimum needs which we have in terms of activity space and equipment storage.

I hope that you will spare the time to read the paper and share it with your Parish Councillors when you learn about plans for new developments in the Parish.

Please will you include the Scouts when you consider the provision of Community facilities on proposed housing developments. We will need your continued support to provide adventurous, character-building, fun-filled inclusive activities for young people in your community!

SCOUTING FOR NEW HOUSING DEVELOPMENTS AROUND HORSHAM

BRIEFING PAPER Part 1

Background

1.0 Scouting is the foremost provider of inclusive adventure, character-building and fun-filled activities for young people. This briefing paper reviews the need for additional Scouting facilities in the Horsham area to cope with demand due to the large numbers of new homes planned for the District. It examines the implications regarding new premises and challenges which will have to be faced. It includes some basic facts about Scouting and the criteria for facilities which could be used by developers as part of their duty to provide for community facilities.

1.1 We are told that if Government and local plans go ahead there will be nearly 20,000 houses being built around Horsham in the next 20 years. For example:

New large estates around Horsham include:

Wickhurst Green, Broadbridge Heath (1000 homes)

Southwater (Berkeley Homes) (1000 homes)

Highwood Village, Horsham (over 1000 homes)

North Horsham (Legal & General, was Liberty) (2750 homes but eventual total of possibly 4500 homes)

Buck Barn development but no details yet

Rookwood development but no details yet

Further new estates will be required in the Horsham area to accommodate the overspill from Crawley and Mid Sussex under the duty for HDC to cooperate with its adjacent local authorities.

1.2 It is clear that many of these new homes, already built, are being occupied by families.

1.3 At the Highwood Village estate (off the A24) people are now moving in. The original planning permission included a community centre which may be suitable for use by Scouts. The development also includes some commercial building. As the building work is well under way, it may be too late to ask for a dedicated Scout HQ in the middle of the housing but perhaps the developer could donate a building on the boundary of the residential and commercial areas for a Scout Group.

1.4 Wickhurst Green is adjacent to Broadbridge Heath and, with the removal of the old by-pass, will be connected to the village better than up to now. We must consider the implications of Wickhurst Green in relation to the existing 1st Broadbridge Heath Scout Group which already has a waiting list.

1.5 The North Horsham site, off the A264 northern by-pass, was promoted originally by the American developer Liberty but has now been taken over by Legal & General. It is likely that there will be further detailed planning applications as L&G bring the building programme forward. L&G are consulting on community facilities and we have responded about provision for Scouting. This will be a very large development of nearly 3000 homes and will justify a dedicated facility for Scouting.

1.6 The Broadacres development by Berkeley homes in Southwater included a hall as a part of the developer's community obligation but unfortunately when the Parish Council sought expressions of interest it was found to be only half the size that would have been suitable for the Scouts. Southwater Sea Scouts still have no permanent home.

Need for more Groups and HQs.

2.1 From our point of view there are two sorts of development. One is characterised by the new homes in Southwater and by the Wickhurst Green development where the new build is an extension of an existing village where we already have at least one Scout Group and will need to accommodate more children. As there is an existing community it makes fund-raising, recruitment of leaders, etc easier but may limit the sites for new Scouting facilities. The other sort of development is on a greenfield site (in every sense of the term), such as North of Horsham, where everything must start from scratch and there is no existing community to support the new Scouting facilities.

2.2 Ideally, we would like Horsham District Council, as strategic planning authority, and the various developers to understand and consider the needs of young people in families attracted to the new residential developments in and around Horsham. Our existing Scout Groups are full, with long waiting lists. No child wants to be on a waiting list!

Challenges.

3.1 Shared premises do not always work well (see below). A fully formed Scout Group will have weekly meetings (usually evenings) for Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and, maybe, Explorer Scouts. Some of Horsham's Scout Groups have two Beaver Colonies, two Cub Packs and/or two Scout Troops (ie, seven sections if Explorer Scouts are included).

Beavers (age 6 to 8 years) meet as early as 5pm and some may not finish until 7:15pm

Cubs (8 to 10½) may meet from 6pm but may not finish until, say 8:15

Scouts (10½ to 15) will generally meet at some time between 6:30 and 9:30

Explorer Scouts (over 15) and Leaders will also have regular evening meetings

3.2 Actual times often depends on availability of leaders

3.3 Alternatively, availability of leaders may depend on meeting times.

Use of premises by other organisations.

4.1 In the past we have been asked about the premises being a Community facility and, therefore, shared by Scouts with other organisations. Past experience has shown that sharing is possible with daytime groups such as playgroups but the intensive evening meetings of a fully functioning Scout Group means that opportunities for evening use by other people may be limited. Evenings are, of course, usually the time when other adult groups want to meet. Weekends can be problematic because any of the Scout Group sections may want to use the premises at weekends, as well as for Adult Leader Training sessions, etc.

4.2 Experience shows that Scout Groups have a need for extensive storage facilities from small craft materials used by Beaver Scouts at weekly meetings to large tents and pioneering equipment for outdoor adventure experiences.

4.3 Some other organisations, such as play groups, who might share the use of a Scout HQ also have extensive storage needs for their play equipment. This has led to problems in the past at joint-use premises where there has been inadequate storage accommodation. The facility has to have extensive storage for both Scout equipment and for that of other users.

4.4 It is sometimes not realised by other people that Scouting is inclusive and open to all. Anyone can join, Scouting is not exclusive. This misunderstanding can artificially limit the possibility for grants for building such premises if they are not for general community use but is not justified in practice.
